# My Book Voice: Teaching Book Talks With Purpose

## Give students the power to share their reading lives.

Book talks are more than summaries—they're opportunities for students to connect, persuade, and celebrate reading. The **My Book Voice** campaign encourages educators to bring book talks into the classroom and share them with families and the wider school community.

## Why Book Talks Matter

Having students write their own book talks helps:

- Build confidence in speaking and listening
- Foster authentic conversations about books
- Encourage peer-to-peer recommendations
- Connect reading to identity, voice, and choice

# **Teaching Book Talks With Purpose**

## Early Elementary (K-Grade 3) | Beginning Readers (Ages 5-8)

Students share short, joyful talks that focus on favorite parts of books. Activities include guided read-alouds, interviews, and "My Book Voice" recordings.

## Intermediate (Grades 4-6) | Developing and Early Adolescent Readers (Ages 9-12)

Students practice summarizing and connecting with peers. They draft, rehearse, and record 60-second book talks, learning from models and class-created rubrics.

#### Secondary (Grades 7–12) | Young Adult Readers (Ages 12+)

Students move beyond summary into persuasion, using ethos, pathos, and logos. They analyze peer talks, create persuasive scripts, and record or respond with videos.

Secondary Student Template: Planning My Book Talk

#### Classroom Extensions

- Host Book Talk Thursday or a bulletin board of covers and QR codes
- Share recordings with families, school community, or morning announcements
- Encourage students to create response or "stitch" videos
- Build a running To-Be-Read (TBR) list from peer recommendations
